Additional Observations and Summary of Activities or Concerns

This week, spread five is gearing up for construction making sure everything is in order for August first, when construction is set to begin. All Aboriginal Monitors went out to Chapleau Lake SSKP524+860 and joined Archaeologist Steve Kasston on the east side of the lake. He had Meridian surveyors mapping each rock by GPS individually near the Horizontal Directional Drilling Site on the east side of Chapleau Lake. Outcome from GPS mapping there were circle formations, arcs and a cairn identified and were recorded, from that these areas will be fenced off before construction begins, markers have been put in place in those areas.

During a tour with Dean Bellegarde, Enbridge Construction Specialist took him out to Chapleau Lake showed him the Archaeological sites that were mapped and recorded. During that visit a bird's nest was found on Right of Way by a Jr Construction Monitor and it was reported to Denny Hayes of Enbridge and Larry Lynn of Banister, a stake was put near the nest for the bird sweepers and environmentalists.

Bird activity tends to slow down around noon, which is why the bird sweepers usually start at dawn to get more areas swept on the right of way before the other crews start their work day.

A tour for the Carry the Kettle First Nation Knowledge holders was on Saturday, we had three planned stops on spread five throughout the day. First stop was at SK WC-1002 Wascana Creek, before going onto Right of Way we bio sprayed everyone's boots, equipment, tires and headed to the creek to look at an area. The group headed to the next site SSKP572+000 where there was an identified archaeological site found on a previous project they plant knowledge holders spoke a bit more on uses of the medicine picked in the areas. The next stop was at SSKP577+000 this area they picked sage and gum weed and a few others, pictured below.
