Well, it's arrived...summer weather and all that the season brings with it. Wisconsin is buzzing with recreational activities that bring family and friends together. Outdoor grilling, hiking, boating and all of the things that bring life to our summer are unfolding.

It's also a season for outdoor repair work. As many of us tend to our home and yard projects, our pipeline crews are also tending to maintenance work that involves crews out along the right-of-way doing surveys, brushing overgrowth, and addressing planned pipeline maintenance. If you are receiving this newsletter, it's likely you have a pipeline or other underground utility on your property. Please call 811 before you dig to schedule no-charge underground utility location and prevent damage or worse.

Some of our readers may be interested in project activity we have proposed and have also wrapped up. The good news is that we've powered up our solar self-power facilities aligned with our Adams and Portage pump station facilities in southern Wisconsin.

Over 61,000 solar panels went online in June. These facilities support our goal of net-zero carbon emissions by 2050.

Our work to progress the proposed Line 5 Wisconsin Segment Relocation Project 41-miles around the Bad River Reservation in northern Wisconsin continues to work its way through the state and federal permitting processes. It takes time, and we support a thorough review. We have committed to at least 10% of the construction workforce on this project to be Native American. To further some of our goals for Native American hire, we are supporting Five Skies Training and Consulting to hold a 4-week training program that sets up Native American citizens to be successful in careers in the construction trades like many associated with the Line 5 Wisconsin Segment Relocation Project. Safety report

Safety of our neighbors, employees, communities and the environment is our number one priority because if we don't get safety right nothing else matters. From 2013 through 2022 inclusive, we invested more than \$11.79 billion in programs that help us maintain or improve the safe operation of our systems across our operations in the U.S. and Canada.

We invest significantly in our systems and leak detection by monitoring our systems 24/7, 365 days per year; continually inspecting pipelines and facilities to ensure optimal safety and reliability performance; right-of-way surveillance by air to watch for potential issues; and monitoring our pipelines through multiple computerized systems, each with a different focus and each using different technology, resources and timing to provide overlapping and layered leak detection.

Public safety agencies held training exercise

Nearly 30 firefighters from Lac Courte Oreilles, City of Hayward, Town of Hayward, Stone Lake and Couderay trained together with Sawyer County representatives, public health officials and Enbridge operations personnel at a tabletop emergency response exercise hosted by the Lac Courte Oreilles Fire Department. Since 2019, a partnership between Five Skies Training and Consulting and Enbridge has broadened as unions, contractors and other groups look to connect Native American job seekers to meaningful careers. "They're gonna open the door for you," says Joel, a program graduate. "Before the Five Skies program I wasn't aware there were so many opportunities," explains Ashley. "My whole life changed," says Melissa.

Bay City Bohemian Hall in Ashland is open for business



Renewed energy is coming from the Bay City Bohemian Hall in Ashland. Local community members Nancy and Dixie of the non-profit's board have engaged nearly Herculean effort to renovate the more than century old community center for the benefit of community members looking for affordable venues for weddings, meetings, and even music festivals. With the support of \$40,000 from an Enbridge grant, significant foundational work was done.

"I'm pretty passionate about wanting this to come back to life. And, it is," said Nancy. "Enbridge was by far our biggest grant, which helped us do a lot of projects. Enbridge appears to be very community minded. Everybody was so helpful."

Economic synergy with Centergy at Central Wisconsin Days



This year was a success. According to Angel Whitehead, President/CEO of Centergy, Inc, "Central Wisconsin Days, an advocacy event of Centergy had record-breaking participation down at the Capital. Nature, education and sports are all in "SCOPE"

In central Wisconsin, community non-profit enhances youth connection with the outdoors. The mission of Sawyer County Outdoor Projects and Education (SCOPE) can be summed up into a simple goal for youth in Wisconsin: Do more stuff outside.

Established in 2008, SCOPE has provided a platform for over 15 years in Hayward, WI for youth to not only participate in more outdoor sports and activities, but also to learn about their natural surroundings and learn sustainable practices in becoming environmental stewards.

More than 1,000 kids are supported by SCOPE each year in a variety of ways. The organization covers program registration fees, provides equipment and tools when necessary, and puts together teams for participation in tournaments and competition.

This summer, the lodge will be getting a major upgrade. SCOPE plans to build an **Environmental Outdoor Education Center and** increase accessibility to water access points, such as the nearby Hay Creek watershed. Here, students will learn about habitat remediation and conservation.

Enbridge is committed to creating sustainable communities near our operations, and supports projects that help improve, grow and nurture our environment. A recent Enbridge \$20,000 Fueling Futures grant will help SCOPE build an outdoor classroom pavilion and improve accessibility to the nearby lake and springs.



Line 5 Wisconsin Segment Relocation Project

Ecofootprint Grant Program



Enbridge is pleased to announce the creation of the new, 2-year, \$500,000 Ecofootprint Grant Program to provide funding to help protect and restore the natural environment. Communities in Wisconsin near and along the Line 5 Segment Relocation Project in Ashland, Bayfield, and Iron counties along with the Bad River and the Red Cliff Band of Lake Superior Chippewa may be eligible to receive grants in varying amounts.

Eligible organizations include non-profit 501(c)3 organizations, Native American Tribes, state government agencies, local governments, and postsecondary academic institutions.

The proposed Line 5 Wisconsin Segment Relocation Project is progressing through the permitting process. The map above shows the proposed project route.

Enbridge is partnering with Lumberjack Resource Conservation & Development Council, Inc. to administer the Ecofootprint Grant Program.
