Much of Enbridge's vast pipeline network crosses rural areas. As such, it's important for landowners along our pipeline rights-of-way to:

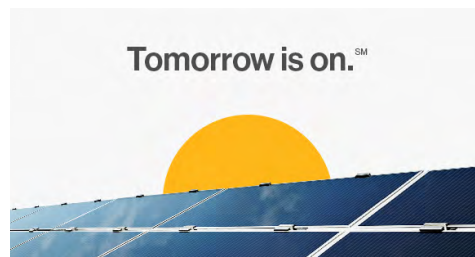
- Call 811 in Wisconsin if you plan on any soil-disturbing activities – including deep tilling, ditching, soil ripping, drain tile installation, digging fence posts, or building roads, sidewalks, driveways, ditches or buildings.

- Know where pipelines are located near you
- Know how to recognize a potential pipeline leak
- Know what to do in a pipeline emergency
- Know the contact information for the Enbridge land representative in your region, as well as our Public Awareness Program

Tomorrow is onSM — solar self-power projects progress in Wisconsin

You may have seen our new ad campaign, Tomorrow is on. We're backing that campaign up with our solar self-power program including two facilities in Adams and Portage, Wisconsin.



Enbridge's innovative solar self-power program integrates no emissions green electricity into our Liquids Pipeline operations to lower the carbon footprint of pump stations, making the transportation of crude oil and liquids more environmentally sustainable.

These local projects combined will create 20 megawatts of solar energy that will offset a portion of the pump stations' electric loads and help power its units to keep liquids flowing in Enbridge's pipelines, delivering the energy people need and want – to heat homes, keep lights on and stay mobile and connected.

"The Portage and Adams solar projects are part of a broader program that Enbridge has underway to supply our pipeline operations with renewable electricity," says Pete Sheffield, Enbridge Chief Sustainability Officer.

The solar self-power program will help Enbridge meet our Environmental, Sustainability and Governance (ESG) goals, which include reaching net-zero GHG by 2050; with an interim target to reduce GHG emissions intensity 35% by 2030.

Our commitments are outlined in our first Indigenous Reconciliation Action Plan (IRAP), which was developed with input from 50 individuals from Indigenous groups in the U.S. and Canada. The IRAP will gauge our progress, help us continue to evolve, and ensure we remain accountable for executing on our commitments to Indigenous peoples."

WRI’s Independent Living Program provides housing assistance to youth who are graduating high school and exiting foster care, offering a hand-up to get them established and living securely on their own.

A \$10-million investment in Superior

Enbridge has been a member of the Superior community for more than 70 years, and our Superior employees settled into a new office earlier this year following the completion of a \$10-million office building using local contractors and local union labor. “Enbridge being in our community is so important. The company continuously gives back,” notes Taylor, President and CEO of the Superior Douglas County Area Chamber.



Prepared and ready to go

Enbridge recently held an emergency response training exercise in Saxon in northeastern Wisconsin alongside local and regional emergency response groups. While we focus heavily on prevention at Enbridge, as a responsible pipeline operator we’re also committed to emergency response readiness. “Every member of Enbridge’s field response and incident management teams is constantly practicing our techniques, tactics and skills, and we’re constantly trying to make them better,” says Gary, an Emergency Response Specialist with Enbridge. “Any time you can train, it’s a plus,” adds Stacy, the Emergency Management Director for Iron County. “It’s also very beneficial to know what resources Enbridge can bring to the table as a good neighbor.”

Training exercises like this with safety and security in mind are performed routinely across our systems including two held in Jefferson County in south central Wisconsin earlier in the year.



An unbelievable advantage for seven counties in northern Wisconsin

A recent donation from Enbridge has allowed the Superior Fire Department to purchase an on-scene decontamination trailer – providing hot showers for firefighters who’ve been battling a blaze, to wash away carcinogens. And as part of mutual aid arrangements with other fire departments in the region, the decontamination trailer will be available to seven counties across northern Wisconsin. “So, 24 hours a day, seven days a week, we’ll be able to take this trailer anywhere in that region – it could be a train derailment, it could be a large warehouse fire, it could be anything,” says Scott Gordon, Fire Chief with Superior Fire Department.

In central Wisconsin, Enbridge also donated a truck to the Cambridge Fire Department, which will be outfitting the truck to serve as a much-needed command vehicle. Command vehicles have become a very important part of any fire department, facilitating complicated communications at the site of large incidents.
