

Alberta Clipper (Line 67) Expansion

North America needs reliable and secure transportation of petroleum supplies. Refineries in the U.S. Midwest and surrounding regions rely on crude oil transported by Enbridge Energy Limited Partnership's Line 67, a 36-inch diameter crude oil pipeline that spans from North Dakota through Minnesota to Superior, Wisconsin.

Line 67 has been operating since 2010. Enbridge increased the capacity of Line 67, outside of a three-mile U.S./Canada border segment, to 800,000 barrels per day (bpd) by adding and modifying pump stations in 2014 and 2015.

Permitting

In November 2012, Enbridge filed an application for a Presidential Permit with the U.S. Department of State (DOS) to authorize Enbridge to transport 800,000 bpd on the existing three-mile segment of the Line 67 pipeline that crosses the international border. On February 10, 2017, DOS issued a Draft Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement (SEIS) as part of its review of Enbridge's application

and held a public comment period from February 10 – March 27, 2017. The Department of State considered comments received during the comment period in preparation of the Final SEIS, which was published on August 11, 2017. The State Department will consider information provided in the Final SEIS, among other factors, as part of the Record of Decision and National Interest Determination for approval or denial of a Presidential Permit for Enbridge's Line 67 Expansion.

Pump Stations

Pump stations play a vital role in moving crude oil through the Enbridge pipeline system. Pump stations contain one or more electrically driven pumping units, strategically located along the pipeline route to maintain the flow and keep it within safe operating limits.
